



To Move the World: JFK's Quest for Peace

As economist Jeffrey Sachs posits here, four key speeches delivered between the conclusion of the Cuban Missile Crisis in October 1962 and the signing of the Partial Nuclear Test Ban Treaty in September 1963 charted the course of Kennedy's vision, particularly the commencement address he gave at American University that June, known today as the Peace Speech. Sachs, a special advisor to the UN secretary-general and twice named one of the 100 most influential leaders in the world by Time magazine, finds lessons in these statements of policy that are pertinent indeed vital in today's world. "In this careful study, Sachs zeroes in on four key speeches Kennedy delivered in the months prior to his assassination. JFK, together with gifted speechwriter Ted Sorenson his 'intellectual alter ego' set out a strategy for nations to live in 'mutual tolerance,' with ramifications that extend into the 21st century. While sound bites of the Kennedy-Sorenson collaboration echo in modern classrooms 'Ask not what your country can do for you' the messages in these four speeches seem all too pertinent today."
